Jeanine McKinney reported a balance of \$7,221.53 in the account. She announced that our Neighborhood Council has the opportunity to apply for a City Grant to help fund one of the Concerts in the Park sponsored by the Prince of Peace Church again this summer. The amount is for \$700.

A vote of the attendees was taken to apply for the Grant. All voted in favor of the application.

CITY LAUNCHED ON-STREET PARKING EVENT Started February 26th.

On-street Parking Violations Include:

- Displayed vehicle registration expired beyond 45 days
- Improper display of vehicle regist ration
- Occupying an area signed "No Parking"
- Parking in the wrong direction, against the flow of traffic
- Parked more than 12 inches from the curb
- Parked on sidewalk/planting strip
- Parked in the intersection
- Parked within 30 feet of a stop/yield sign or other signal
- Parked within 20 feet of a crosswalk
- Parked within 15 feet of a fire hydrant
- Parked within 5 feet of a driveway or alley entrance
- Advertising or repairing a vehicle on the street
- Continuous parking (72 hours in residential areas)

Public education through courtesy notices is an important element of the Spring Clean-up event. The courtesy notices give citizens the opportunity to fix or correct their parking situation they may not be aware is a violation.

Kathleen Weinand from the STA gave an update on the changes proposed for some bus routes in 2021 and 2022. There are no changes planned for Route 23. (the Indian Trail Route).

Jamie Bowman (State Farm Insurance) would like to sponsor 3 Free Movie Nights in Pacific Park this Summer. They would be held on Saturday nights...June 27, July 18, and August 8. The Council was asked to help sponsor the events.

A vote of the attendees was taken. All were in favor of donating \$400 towards the Movie Nights.
