An e-mail was sent out to the Neighborhood members regarding the projects scheduled for road repairs in the Indian Trail area.

There will be no Curb-side Pick-Up this year. Dump passes can be requested and applied for online. Available May through November. No post cards will be mailed out.

Jeanine McKinney reported she received a \$50 donation from a neighbor. That brings the balance in the account up to \$7,084.53. The Grant that was applied for recently has been accepted. It will be used to cover the cost for a Band at P.O.P. this summer and the cost of purchasing cloth Grocery Totes with the NITNC Logo to deliver to new families in the neighborhood.

Officer Keith Cler reported a substantial increase in calls this past month in the area. They included 2 accidents, 2 garage burglaries, many malicious mischief calls, 3 vehicle prowlings, and some material thefts from construction sites.

Mark Davies gave the Community Assembly Report. COPS NW at Shadle Center will be collecting old and expired medications for proper disposal on April 24 from 10 am to 2 pm.

COPS NW at Shadle Center will be offering a Shred Day to safely dispose of old personal records on April 30 from 11 am till 2 pm.

Mobile Speed Sign applications due to ONS by April 12.

Despite strong vocal opposition from most of the City Neighborhoods and the Community Assembly, ONS and Waste Disposal have decided the Neighborhood Clean-Up program will again be limited to dump passes this year. Dump Passes will again only be accepted at the City Waste to Energy Plant, neither County plants will accept them. Pass Amount will be \$25.00 and have to be applied for on-line.

The quarterly combined Community Assembly and City Council meeting will be held on April 29 starting at 5:30 pm via WEBEX. Meeting is open to all to attend.

The City of Spokane is creating a Housing Action Plan to help increase housing options that meet the needs of residents at all income levels. A Housing Action Plan defines strategies and actions that promote greater housing diversity, affordability, and access to opportunity. Craig Madsen of Shephard/Healing Hooves spoke about the program that uses goats to help with weed and brush control along city trails and in parks. He plans to bring the goats to MeadowGlen Park area around the middle of May. The neighborhood will be notified when they will be there for viewing only. (No petting).

Jeanine brought up the idea of purchasing some inexpensive clear plastic bags that we could use to distribute some information about our Neighborhood Council to some of the new homes in our area. It would be a good way to let people know about our neighborhood group and may help to increase our membership. The Executive Council members present all agreed to go forward with this plan.
