The Disposal passes cover up to \$25 disposal fees at the Waste to Energy Facility at 2900 S Geiger Blvd.

There are plans to have either a Spring or Fall Curb Side Pick up this year.

There will be no concerts at Audubon or Shadle Parks this summer.

The Cop Shop is seeking more volunteers from the Indian Trail area.

Jeanine McKinney reported the balance in the checking remains at \$7,004.94.

It is time to apply for the Community Engagement Grant offered by the city again this year in the amount of \$850. It was suggested that we use \$164.00 of it to renew our Zoom account for another year and \$686.00 to sponsor one of the concerts at Prince of Peace Church in July. A motion was made and a vote was taken to apply for the grant. All of the 7 members present at the time of the vote approved the motion to apply for the Grant.

Terry introduced our new Neighborhood Resource Officer, Tim Schwering. He likes to focus on what he sees are the top calls for service in various areas such as Businesses, Residential, and Apartment/ Condos. He is looking forward to working with our Neighborhood.

Mark Davies presented the Community Assembly Report:

Councilman Zack Zappone gave an update on the City Council. He spoke about the projects planned for some street repairs, school safety projects, and traffic calming in our area.

They explained the fundamentals of how a Hydroelectric Facility works and the measures taken to ensure that proper water levels ae maintained throughout the seasons.
