Jeanine McKinney gave the Treasurer's report. \$30.00 was collected at the last meeting bringing the balance in the account to \$6,506.49.

Lieutenant Jake Jensen reported on the crime in our area. There were a number of garage burglaries in the newer homes located North of Barnes Rd in Sundance Meadows. In some cases, access was gained by breaking into cars that were parked outside with garage door openers in sight. The suspect was caught and is now in jail. The State Farm Insurance and the Texaco Station on Indian Trail were also burglarized.

He said the increased Emphasis Patrol lately on Indian Trail and the 30 mph signs posted have helped to decrease speeding.

He also gave advice on how to avoid Scams. Never give out any personal information on the phone. Be wary of callers that say you must act immediately.

Kevin Freibott, Senior Planner for the City of Spokane, spoke about a Comprehensive Plan to address our on-going housing crisis in Spokane. It is called Shaping Spokane Housing. It is designed to research and explore the growth and development in the city. It aims to address our housing needs while preserving community character and livability.
