

Terry Deno opened the meeting at 6:00 p.m.

He announced there is going to be a community meeting held at Price of Peace Church on November 19th 2,025 at 5:30 p.m. Whipple Consulting Engineers, LLC will discuss their proposal for an approximately 406-Lot/796 unit Preliminary Long Plat/PUD for future residential development. He encouraged everyone to attend. Our next meeting will be held on January 13th, 2026. No meeting in December.

Jeanine McKinney gave the Treasurer's Report.

There was a deposit of \$27.00 for donations from the October meeting.

A check for \$350.00 was written to the Spokane Cops Shop for a donation that was voted on at our October meeting.

Reconciled balance at 10/31/2025 was \$6,051.24.

Assistant Chief of Police, Steve Wohl spoke about their emphasis on addressing the homelessness issue. He introduced Sgt. Bryan Tafova and Officer Steve Donges who both work patrol in our area. In late October Spokane City Council passed the "Safe and Accessible Places Act. This ordinance gives police more authority to enforce anti-camping laws and connect individuals with services.

Judge Mary Logan explained the workings of the Spokane Municipal Community Court and how they address the various problems related to homelessness. Their emphasis is on addressing the problems and offering the individuals treatment options including follow-up care.

Dan Knechtel introduced Rhett Redshaw who is going to be working with Dan as a co-Community Assembly representative. Rhett gave the report from the Community Assembly.

The City of Spokane is working on a new Comprehensive Plan. It is called PlanSpokane 2046. It is a periodic update to the city's long-range plan for growth over the next 20 years. It is due in 2026. Other topics discussed were :
